IRCC MEETING MINUTES

Saturday August 1^{st,} 2020 Recorded by Club Secretary - Jim Giallombardo

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by attending members.

Meeting to Order: The monthly meeting of the IRCC was called to order at 10:00 am by President Jerry McGhee.

New Members and Guests: Guests, Chuck and Wesley Miller, hosts of the Merry Boozer YouTube channel will be sponsors of the IRCC Toys for Tots Fly-In to be held on Nov21-22. Other guests attending were Steve Griffin and David Cox.

Awards and Certificates: Dennis Peterson received the Model of the Month award for last month's presentation of his twin, kit built Shinbau models. The July Sportsmanship award was presented to Ron McKie, Dan Hudson, Jerry McGhee, Bill Pawl, Tommy Nolin, Don Patterson and Jim Giallombardo. Terry Buck received his 100 Missions Patch award.

Minutes: A motion to accept the July minutes as posted in the club newsletter, Propwash, was made and accepted.

Treasurers Report: Jerry McGhee presented the treasurer's report for Gary Snyder in his absence. the IRCC is currently in good shape. A graph showing all income and expenditures will be shown and explained to any interested member.

Membership Report: We currently have 118 members.

Field and Maintenance Report: Bill Pawl reported the west charging station had some corrosion which has been repaired. The new 200-watt panels have been received and will be installed on the east charging station. The grass is growing fast and needs continuous mowing. Additional help is encouraged to help with mowing. Fire ant mounds are abundant and anyone noticing a new area should report this to Bill.

Safety Report: Pres. Jerry McGhee reported for Richard Moffatt in his absence. No safety incidents were reported. Everyone is encouraged to continue announcing TO's and landings.

Instructors Report: Jeff Hughes reported that all the trainers are in good condition. Jeff is working on minor repairs to the trainer donated by Dan Hudson. Newest member Orbin Lopez and his daughter are both doing well with their training.

Club Newsletter/Website: The club newsletter is going well. David Raff thanked everyone for their submission and asked to keep them coming in. Ron McKie reported all addresses are maintained under a secured page which requires log-in to access. The instructor pilot information will be kept on the public page to be accessible to persons interested in learning to fly.

New Field Search Committee: Jim Giallombardo reported no new search information at this time.

Old Business: Jerry McGhee encouraged members to continue with the 100-mission goal for 2020. It is important all members continue to log "all" their flights to support IRCC flight activity.

All members are continuously encouraged to avoid overflight of the bird and wildlife sanctuary north of the field boundaries.

New Business and Future Events: The AMA National Model Aviation day, and IRCC family fun and fly in day with be held August 15, 2020. Volunteers are needed to help with field setup at 07:00 am prior to the event start. Tommy Nolin, Bill Pawl and Jim Giallombardo volunteered to help.

The FTE Top Gun event scheduled for Oct 28-Nov1, 2020.

The IRCC annual Toys for Tots fun fly-in sponsored by the Merry Boozer You Tube Channel will be held on Nov 21-22 and requires a \$10.00 entry fee plus a gift toy. Guests Chuck and Wesley Miller described their You Tube channel and their appreciation to sponsor to the event. They asked IRCC members for input on what articles of interest they'd like to see on the You Tube channel. They are affiliates of both Horizon Hobby and Motion RC and may have reps from either company attend. The Merry Boozers will also have hand-made awards to present at the event. They have contact with Kermit Weeks, owner of the Fantasy of Flight, and will discuss with him the possibility of a fly-over during the event.

Wally Sundey will talk with Frank Tiano to see if he would sponsor a tent for guests to store their aircraft during the event. Wally also asks for additional members to step forward to volunteer to help with club events. Richard Glazer noted his appreciation to Bill Pawl for the extreme amount of work his expends of keeping the field maintained. 



IRCC AUGUST 2020 Award Winner JEFF HUGHES

The August 2020 Society of Aircraft Demolishers "Aircraftus Fragmentum" was called to order by the President of the IRCC! Nominations were as quiet as a blue waterfall in the Hawaiian Islands, until the silence was broken with one single, solitary nomination. This month's sole nominee and award winner was non-other than the IRCC's Chief Flight Instructor, Mr. Jeff Hughes. It's not often that Jeff crashes, he's known for running a meticulously kept fleet of aircraft in his hangar, however, when he does crash, just like a politician on Twitter, it makes news!

The Spitfire. A graceful and elegant WWII fighter who was flown by very brave airmen who ultimately saved England from the tyranny of Hitler's Reich! As Winston Churchill said after the Battle of Britain, "Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few." It was also said by the pilots who flew the Spitfire that "She was a lady in the air but a bitch on the ground". This was derived from the handling characteristics of the Spitfire's very narrow main landing gear. As long as you stayed within your envelop on the ground, the Spit will behave, but get a little aggressive and she'll put you in your place! If you haven't figured it out by now with this shameless foreshadowing, the Spitfire just happens to be the subject of this month's SAD award. Now, onto the story.

As many of you are aware, there was a great movie made in the 1980s where the 1980 U.S. Navy U.S.S. Nimitz Aircraft Carrier traveled back in time to December 6, 1941 just outside of Pearl Harbor, Hawaii after a freak storm. The movie, "The Final Countdown" set in motion the 1980 U.S. Navy aircraft carrier Commander's dilemma of whether or not to engage the Japanese and put an abrupt halt to WWII's initial Pacific battle with the carrier strike force on board the Nimitz. The plot and theory of time travel lays out some wonderful time travel plots, but more importantly, there are scenes where F-14 Tomcats dogfight Japanese Zeros and that never gets old to watch!

Enter Jim Giallombardo. If you will recall from last month's SAD award, Jim set out to shoot approaches on the USS BADCOCK Trailer yard and after a few tries, he was all set. It was all going well until a rogue wave wind hit Jim's F-4 and the aircraft was violently flipped in the turbulence between the trailers! Well my friends, the Phoenix has risen, and Jim's F-4 is alive and well with Blue Angel markings! As the Final Countdown is one of Jim Giallombardo's favorite movies, Jim has always wanted to match a 1980s fighter with a WWII aircraft, and as you might guess by now, that's what's going to happen.

Back to our victim, I, I, I mean Jeff Hughes, SAD patch award winner for August 2020. Jeff pulled the Spitfire out of his truck; meanwhile, Jim Giallombardo pulled out his F-4 and got it ready on tactical alert ready to launch within 30 seconds from any lift off of a WWII fighter. Jeff, unaware of the plot about to unfold, set out to fuel and ready his Spitfire for a great sortie; or so he thought.

As Jim watched Jeff crank his Spitfire and get the engine running, Jim launched his F-4, code named "Lazarus" and circled high above waiting for his opportunity. Jeff taxied in position and as Jeff pushed the throttle forward on his Spitfire, Jim's F-4 rolled into a split S and pounced the Spitfire as it began it's takeoff roll. As Jeff's Spitfire's tail wheel lifted off the ground, running only on the mains, Jim's F-4 leveled out in a high-speed run behind the Spitfire. As Jeff's Spitfire main wheels came off the runway, you could hear the uncanny sound of "BRRRRRTTTTT" as Jim's F-4, modified with a scaled down version of the F-4's M-61 Vulcan Cannon fired away and poured lead into the Spitfire, and shortly after that riveting sound, Jeff's Spitfire engine sputtered. Smoke began to pour from the exhaust and his flying speed rapidly disappeared as he was only 3 feet in the air. With his airspeed diminished, the Spitfire entered into it's stall speed envelope and the left wing violently dropped, sending the aircraft into the ground in a very elegant cartwheel motion, detaching the wing from the fuselage and breaking the mid fuselage until it finally rested on the grass of the IRCC. Jim's F-4 overflew the wreckage at 2 feet and he pitch-up into a victory roll over the Spitfire, recreating a new potential scene for the movies, America's F-4 vs the British Spitfire.

We're very happy for Jim, that his F-4 is alive, but we are SAD for Jeff that his Spitfire is in tatters. This story sounds way, way better than the story that Jeff offered during his award ceremony that the Spitfire was underpowered and stalled on takeoff. So...enjoy this version. Any good fighter pilot story contains 10% truth and I think we're there in this version!

It is with great honor and pride that we offer this month's SAD patch to Mr. Hughes, who has courageously won this month's SAD Patch Award! It is the eighth noted crash of the 2020 flying season; an award that we are all subject to earning at any given time in consolation for our stricken aircraft who we bravely launch into the skies in a constant pursuit of our Constitutional right to pursue and find happiness.

Thank you, Jeff, for this offering to the SAD community!

The 3RD Annual IRCC Tri-Fecta Fun Fly took place on the Academy of Model Aviation's National Model Aviation Day, just as it has for the last 3 years! In what was, perhaps, the hottest day ever in Florida, 20 brave souls set-out to be the Tri-Fecta Fun Fly Champion!

This year marked the addition of visitors to the IRCC Tri-Fecta Fun Fly and 6 visitors from the central Florida area joined us to compete. Wesley Miller, host and Co-host, Chuck Miller of the YouTube channel the Merry Boozer's; Rich Baker, host of the YouTube channel The RC Informer; father and son team Carlisle Cox Sr an Jr, and Fred Boyer. We thank them for coming to participate and their friendship! If you get a chance, please like and subscribe to our YouTubers, it doesn't cost a thing and they put out a lot of great content!

The Tri-Fecta Fun Fly has evolved into the following three events: 1. Fly for 2 minutes without any assistance. Closest one to 2 minutes wins. 2. Precision landing, points are accumulated by 3 landings on the paved runway and points are accumulated where you land on the runway. 3. Guess your speed. The pilot calls a speed and the objective is to fly that speed through the doppler radar gun. Closest one to the called speed wins.

For the 2-minute event and Guess your speed event, 1st place earned 100 points, 2nd Place 75 points, 3rd Place 50 points and all others receive 25 points. For the Precision Landing Event you earn the points you get depending on where you land. The most points you can earn on landing is 120 points. As expected, the contestants did well in some events but not all. The trick to winning the Tri-Fecta Fun Fly is to be consistent and concentrate.

The first event of the Tri-Fecta Fun Fly was the 2-minute flight. The winner of this event was Tommy Nolin, who landed at 2:00:76. 2nd place winner was 2019 Defending Champion, John Burdin who landed at 2:00:79 and 3rd place was Andy Bolig who landed at 1:59:37. These guys really know their stuff! The fact that 1st and 2nd were separated by 3 hundredths of a second was Olympic caliber! 2nd and 3rd were separated by less than 1 second!

The second event of the Tri-Fecta Fun Fly was the precision landing. The runway was marked off with boxes and each box carried points. The top box was 8 feet wide and carried the maximum number of points, 40. First place in this event was dominated by Rich Baker who got a perfect score by landing in the 8 foot box 3 times in a row to claim the maximum number of points 120! 2nd place was Bill Pawl who pulled in 110 points. 3rd place was won by Ryan Roberts who scored 100 points. Ryan and Wally Sundey actually tied for 3rd place and in the land-off, Ryan prevailed.



The third event was Guess Your Speed. There was actually a 3-way tie when all was said and done. Ryan Roberts, Diego Escobar and Wesley Miller all tied as they were within .5 mph of their called speed! In the fly-off, Ryan prevailed and won 1st Place by being .1 mph from his called speed. Wesley Miller won 2nd place and he was consistent at .5 mph off his called speed and Diego got 3rd and was 2.5 mph from his called speed.

After the individual heats were scored the points were tabulated for the overall scores. Coming in at 1st place with 225 points was Ryan Roberts to be the 2020 IRCC Tri-Fecta Champion! 2nd place went to Tommy Nolin with 205 points. 3rd place went to last year's defending champion, John Burdin with 175 points.

This event is a lot of fun and we thank all who participated in the flying portion of the event. I would like to thank those who helped me set-up and score the IRCC Tri-Fecta Fun Fly. Chris Trumble, Don Patterson, Bill Pawl, Jim Giallombardo, Brian Evans, Peyton McGhee, Kathie McGhee and a very special thank you to Sonya Nolin who kept the pilots moving and tabulated all of the scores.

We look forward to hosting this event again next year in 2021! If you have any ideas for the IRCC Tri-Fecta Fun Fly, let us know and we'll consider them. The IRCC Tri-Fecta Fun Fly is designed to challenge you without breaking your airplane and it is events that any airplane can do.

FLY FOR TWO MINUTES



The 1st event of the day was the **Two Minute Flight**

Rules: Time begins when the aircraft wheels leave the ground. The pilot commences to fly his/her aircraft for two minutes without the aid of a timer or encouragement from the crowd or bystanders. Time ends when the aircraft lands on the paved runway. Closest to the two-minute mark is the winner.

(**Right Center**) Defending Champion from 2019 John Burdin landed very close behind Tommy with a flight time of 2:00:79 to take 2nd Place.


(**Right Bottom**) Trailing less than a second behind was Andy Bolig who claimed the 3rd Place spot with a time of 1:59:37.

PRECISION LANDING







The second event was the

Precision Landing

Rules: There are 7 landing zones marked on the runway with the center being only 8' long and the others progressing on either side in 16', 24' and 32' lengths. Each zone has point allocated with the highest being 40 for the center zone. The pilot will make 3 "touch & go" landings with each landing being scored based on the zone the wheels touch into.


(**Above**) With a perfect score of 120 points, Rich Baker (YouTube Channel R/C Informer) won the event with 3 landing in the 40-point (8') zone giving him bragging rights and claiming 1st Place!

(**Center**) Bill Pawl nailed the 40-point zone twice but just missed on one attempt finishing with 110 points and 2nd Place.

(**Bottom**) Ryan Roberts was also 'on fire" with two 40-point landings but overshot on his last attempt into the 20-point zone giving him 3rd Place honors with a score of 100 points.

GUESS YOUR SPEED



The third and last event of the day was

Guess Your Speed

Rules: The pilot will announce his projected speed prior to take off. Each will have 3 attempts to fly that speed. Speed is measured using a Doppler Speed Gun. The closest matched speed of the three attempts to the speed called by the pilot is used. The pilot may call any speed prior to take off. Landing on the paved runway is mandatory. Landings in the grass results in a 0 for that run.

This was the closest event of the day with a 3-way tie after the first run resulting in a "fly-off". The results were as follows:

(**Top**) Ryan Roberts prevailed being .1mph from his called speed to claim 1st Place.

(**Center**) Wesley Miller of *The Merry Boozers* YouTube Channel took 2nd Place with a .5mph variance from his called speed.

(**Bottom**) This positioned Diego Escobar for 3rd Place honors!
