The National Model Aviation Day 2022 is approaching August 13, 2022! The IRCC will host a 3 in 1 event: Fly-in/Family day/5th Annual Tri-Fecta Fun Fly. Any aircraft (minus turbine) is welcome to come and fly while the Tri-Fecta Fun Fly is underway! Rules for the Tri-Fecta Fun Fly is published in this edition of the Propwash. These are non-plane-breaking events that are designed to test your piloting skills without breaking your airplane. Events are as follows:

1st Event: Fly for 2 Minutes 2nd Event: Precision Landing 3rd Event: Guess Your Speed

After the National Model Aviation Day we will have 1 event remaining for 2022:

- Motion RC Toys for Tots Fly In at IRCC November 3-6, 2022! Our YouTube friends, the Merry Boozers, Wesley, Lori and Chuck Miller have been hired by Motion RC and Motion RC has asked to be the sponsor for this fly in! More details to follow as they develop!

Even if you get your "100", please keep logging your sorties throughout the year as it is interesting to see the number of sorties that get logged by our members

As a reminder, please do not fly over our northern boundary, which is the Se7en Wetlands and a bird sanctuary just north of our field. If you see someone flying over the wetlands say something to that pilot! The IRCC membership has been doing a great job not flying over this boundary since it was made aware to us in February 2020!

The IRCC membership unanimously approved a parking plan for the IRCC that is now in effect on each weekend and during events. If you're not coming to the IRCC to fly, please park away from the main pavilion in one of the approved non-flying spots. There is an approved IRCC parking plan diagram of the "where to park" in this issue of the Propwash and we will keep it in there for perpetuity. If you're not here to fly, please keep the spots under and near the pavilion open and don't park in the field, which allows flyers with trailers the opportunity to have "swing room" to back their trailers into the pavilion.

No guest should be flying unless they are invited by an IRCC member, the member is present when their guest arrives, and the guest has a valid AMA membership. If you're unsure, ask the person in question to see their AMA and who their IRCC sponsor is; as a member of the IRCC you have that right.

Thank you all for being awesome and taking care of business and being great RC modelers! It is truly an honor to be your President and I enjoy flying with you!

"Over & Above" Award: Drew Powell for his attendance and participation at the AMA Junior Camp in Muncie, Indiana.



The July 2022 IRCC SAD Committee came to order like with smooth precision with one wrap of the gavel! The nominees flowed to the sacrificial nomination floor like a finely aged wine! Too numerous to mention them all, however, there is something to be said for a fresh kill and how that type of meat usually makes for a fine meal! Such is the case of Ron McKie who had the unfortunate mishap within the hour prior to the nomination of this month's SAD award!

Funny thing about our hobby "radio control airplanes" is that those words that make up the description of our beloved hobby has considerable meaning. One must have a radio as an initial right of passage to enjoy this hobby. Control must be maintained throughout the flight and having an aircraft completes the enjoyment circle in this hobby that is "radio control airplanes". In the 55 SAD award articles that I have authored since 2018 at the IRCC, it is the word "control" that seems to be the center of all of these articles; in particular, the loss of control for a myriad of reasons that bring the readers enjoyment in reading these articles!

One part of control that must be maintained is visual observation of the aircraft in particular that one is flying during the sortie. Failure to maintain visual observation can lead to loss of control as the hand-eye-coordination to control the flight destabilizes that one sacred and all-important word that separates a wonderful flight from a disastrous flight...control!

On the day of Ron's unfortunate mishap, he was controlling his aircraft, right up to the part that he was not as he went to avoid another aircraft in the pattern, he momentarily took his eyes off of his airplane and when he went to re-establish eye contact with his aircraft, his eyes inadvertently picked up another aircraft, similar in size and shape to his and began flying it, to which he noted that it didn't respond to his inputs; at which point he realized that he was flying the wrong aircraft and by the time he found his aircraft, it was impacting terra-firma.

It is with great honor and pride that we offer this month's SAD patch to Mr. McKie for the SAD Patch Award! It is the seventh noted crash of the 2022 flying season; an award that we are all subject to earning at any given time in consolation for our stricken aircraft who we bravely launch into the skies in a constant pursuit of our Constitutional right to pursue and find happiness.

Thank you, Ron for this offering to the SAD community!

MODEL OF THE MONTH!

Carl Goldberg "PROTÉGÉ" By: Luke Reither



Ever since I was around 5 years old, I have always been fascinated by this hobby. I remember going out to the field with my dad and his dad and watching them fly. The sound and the smell of the sweet nitro fuel filled the atmosphere, and it always gave me this rush. The best bonding time was when my dad would let me control the plane while he was standing in front and his hands were covering mine.

By the age of 11 my gramps bought me my first kit as a birthday present, this was the Carl Goldberg "Protégé". This was the first major project my dad and I did together and there were many memories that were created during the building process of this plane. There was one time where a big spider was crawling across a wing rib and my dad poured cyanoacrylate glue on it while I spray it with the insta-bond. The spider started to produce smoke and to this day, I do believe that spider is still glued to that wing rib.

The kit took my dad and I about a year to build and originally powered by the Super Tigre 61 nitro engine and a 12-ounce fuel tank. The airplane had all Futaba 3003 servos mounted and ran on the 72-megahertz system. The first maiden flight of it, my gramps flew down and he took part in one of the first and last flights with it and boy do I remember it like yesterday.

Severe storm warnings were issues in the county our field was at. Luckily it wasn't raining as of yet but with 60 mile per hour winds running to the northwest, it did make it pretty difficult to fly. At full throttle, it looked like it was almost standing still and barely moving across the sky. When the plane whipped around it looked like a jet but none the less, my dad was able to successfully land the plane, running the engine at full throttle during the landing. Man, that was one memory I would never forget. My dad and I flew it a few more times but unfortunately, life got in the way.

My parents got divorced and my gramps passed away. I went off to military school, so all the r/c planes my dad owned was literally a time capsule holding so many memories. The "Protégé" ended up sitting in my dad's garage for about 25 years and at Christmas time this past year, my dad gave me all of his and my gramps r/c collection. It is a lot of stuff that has been collected throughout the generations, including my first plane.

I got it home and thought it would be ready to go to the field but unfortunately the horizontal and vertical stabilizer needed to be reglued. I took it home and reglued them, brought back out and realized that the elevator came lose, I took it home put new hinges on it and fixed the stuck push rod for the elevator. Took it back out and it wasn't getting good pressure to the engine. I took the monokote covering off of the fuselage and replaced the fuel tank, and fuel lines, and swapped the engine to an O.S. 61 FX. Went back to the field and the plane had some carburetor trouble, so I swapped the motor back to the Super Tigre 61.

Jeff and I got a few successful flights with it and boy I felt like a kid at a candy store. When I got the engine running smoothly at home for the first time, I had my dad on a facetime call and both him and I were in tears. We were just crying with joy, and I feel like the time capsule was opened when I got the engine running. Like all the memories my dad and I had together with it, just came back. It was a sheer joy to see this old bird fly again and it will have many more flights to come.

5th Annual IRCC TRI-FECTA FUN FLY

The events for this Club Fun-Fly are meant to be non-plane breaking events that any aircraft can do that will test your skill and your luck. Have fun, stay safe, keep your wings level and hit whatever you're going to hit as gently as you can. This Fun Fly will take place on Saturday August 13, 2022, at 08:30 start time in conjunction with the IRCC Family Day and the AMA's National Model Aviation Day. This early start allows us to finish for any unscheduled afternoon thunderstorms.

TROPHIES and RIBBONS

Three events 1st, 2nd, 3rd place for each event with a ribbon for each place. 1st, 2nd, 3rd place trophies for overall combined scores to the top three finishers.

THE EVENTS

Event 1: Fly for 2 minutes Event 2: Precision Landing Event 3: Guess Your Speed

MAXIMUM POINTS PER EVENT:

EVENT 1: 100 EVENT 2: 120 EVENT 3: 100

TOTAL MAXIMUM NUMBER OF POINTS COMBINED: 320 Points

THE UNBENDABLE RULES FOR ALL EVENTS

- 1. Qualifications: Must be an IRCC member (or a guest of an IRCC member).
- 2. 2022 Rule Addendum: A pilot may use a different aircraft for each event, however, in the event the aircraft does not complete an event, a substitute aircraft will not be used to complete the event.
- 3. Scoring: In order for a score to be tallied at least one wheel needs to land on the paved runway in each event prior to contacting the ground.
- 4. Any crash in any event will result in a score of Zero for that event. Contestant will finish with the points they have earned prior to the crash.

INDIVIDUAL EVENT RULES:

EVENT 1: FLY FOR TWO MINUTES

Time begins when the aircraft wheels leave the ground. Pilot commences to fly his/her aircraft for two minutes without the aid of any timer or encouragement from the crowd and/or by-standers. Detection of transmitter timers will result in a zero score. Time ends when the aircraft lands on the paved runway. Closest to the 2-minute time mark + or – (under or over the 2 minutes) will be ranked. Scoring is as follows:

1st – 100 points

 $2^{nd} - 75$ points

3rd – 50 points

4th and below – 25 points


EVENT 2: PRECISION LANDING

Pilots will take off and make three touch and go landings with each landing being scored on the zone the wheel(s) touch into. IRCC Runway is 585 feet long. The scoring portion for this event will be 152 feet of scoring zones on the runway divided in 7 zones of 32' 24' 16' 8' 16' 24' 32'. In case of wind direction change, the direction of the take-off will determine the score sequence.

i.e. left to right take off. The score will be 10/20/30/40/20/10/5

One wheel of the main landing gear has to contact the scoring section of the runway and aircraft must maintain control after landing and remain in an airworthy condition.

There will be 3 scored attempts, the pilot will have to call the landing prior entering base leg. If pilot fails to land the score will be 0 and one attempt will be used. Any go around without touching the runway will result in a zero score.



EVENT 3: Guess Your Speed

The pilot will call his speed prior to flight. The pilot will then take his/her aircraft off and have three attempts to fly that speed. Speed will be measured by a Doppler radar gun. The closest matched speed of the three attempts to the speed called by the pilot will win. The pilot may call any speed prior to take off. For example: Pilot 1 calls 45 mph and flies 46mph. Pilot 2 calls 55 mph and flies 53 mph. Pilot 1 would win as they are +1mph and pilot 2 is – 2 mph. If I pilot fails to land on the paved runway the score is 0.

Scoring is as follows: 1st – 100 points 2nd – 75 points 3rd – 50 points 4th and below – 25 points




MEMBER PHOTO SPOTLIGHT!


